Theatre Omnibus (Massachusetts, USA) The Chess Plaver

by Richard McElvain, after Stefan Zweig's The Royal Game



Stefan Zweig's gripping novella brought to life by Richard McElvain in a captivating one-man-show

In a Nazi prison, a battle to the death inside one man's mind. The smouldering coals of solitary confinement fighting the blazing fire of his imagination. After stealing a book of chess tournaments he divides his conscious self into two feuding chess masters. That's the wild ride of the first half of Richard McElvain's reimagining of the classic by **Stefan Zweig**. After the hero escapes the Nazis, the play follows him to a chess master tournament. Testing himself, daring himself to walk the edge of a volcano of madness, he challenges the greatest chess player in the world to a match. Written and performed by award winning actor Richard McElvain, The Chess Player blazes through this blistering saga of survival, finally ruined by hubris. The production is underscored by a rich and complex soundscape created by **Larry Buckley**.

This world premiere is based on Jewish Austrian **Stefan Zweig**'s classic short story, published as The Royal Game in 1941, while Zweig himself was fleeing the Nazis, living in Bath and London, before moving to New York, and then Brazil. In 1942, following a major Axis success, Zweig was overcome by despair at the idea of a Nazi victory, and he and his wife committed suicide.

Richard McElvain, winner of both the Elliot Norton Award (Boston's Tony Award) and the Independent Reviewers of New England Award for his performance of another one-man-show, Conor McPherson's Saint Nicholas, has created successful stage adaptations of the works of Edgar Allen Poe, Washington Irving, O Henry and Saki. He has translated and directed four plays of **Molière** as well as his own adaptation of **Sophocles** Antigone, in which he played Creon. He has played Tartuffe in Tartuffe, MacBeth in MacBeth and Galileo in Brecht's Galileo. He has played Harry Cohn in Angels in America, Parts I and II, George in Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? and appeared in films with Jennifer Lawrence, Cher, Wynona Ryder, and Bob Hoskins.
